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## Knoxville PCA church visits Lookout Mountain for morning worship

When the Rev. David Howe told his congregation in Knoxville, Tenn., that it would meet 110 miles from its church building the following Sunday, it didn't mean the church was moving.

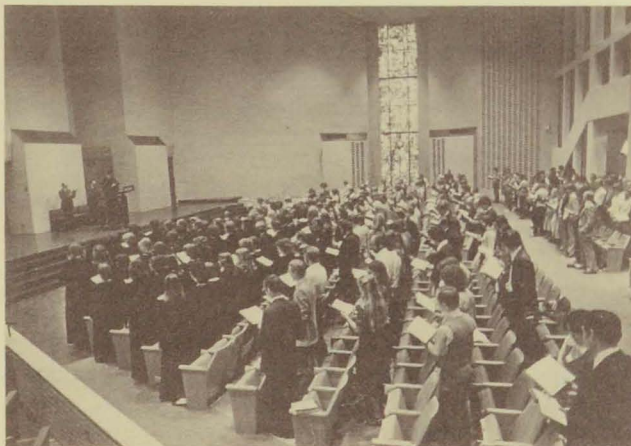
It was a temporary visit, organized by the people of Ebenezer Presbyterian Church, the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Lookout Mountain, and Covenant College. The church from Knoxville was coming to the Covenant campus, two hours from home, for its morning worship service Nov. 16.

At 10:30 in the morning, a large busload of Ebenezer people moved through fog and rain into the Covenant parking lot and unloaded by the Dora Maclellan Brown Memorial Chapel and Fine Arts Building. Already inside was most of the congregation of the Lookout Mountain Reformed Presbyterian Church.

The service included special music by the Covenant College Chorale and a duet by two Lookout Mountain musicians. The Rev. Robert Milliken of Lookout Mountain presided, and the Rev. Howe of Knoxville preached.

Afterward, the Knoxville church ate dinner in the college's Great Hall dining room.

Dr. Marion Barnes, Covenant's chancellor, and Mr. Oliver Smith, Covenant trustee and moderator of the Ebenezer session, coordinated the event.



The joint service took on special meaning because the two denominations from which the churches come, the Presbyterian Church in America and the Reformed Presbyterian Church, Evangelical Synod, are currently discussing joining together. A meeting between the two denominations was held at Covenant in late October.

## Barnes to give keynote at science symposium

Dr. Marion D. Barnes, chancellor at Covenant, will present the keynote address to the American Association for the Advancement of Science about new uses for sulfur. The speech will be made at the association's annual meeting in January.

He will tell his colleagues about a method of modifying sulfur for use as a road pavement. The discovery should help relieve the country's energy shortage, as crude oil normally used for asphalt could be diverted back to refined fuel.

Dr. Barnes' speech, called "Recent Development in Sulfur: New Uses for an Ancient Material," was arranged by the U.S. Federal Highway Administration which has tested the new product in Florida, Texas and Georgia.

Dr. Barnes served as president of Covenant from 1964 to 1978. He was formerly director of industrial research at the Sulfur Institute in Washington, D.C., and also served as chairman of the Air Pollution Control Board in Chattanooga.

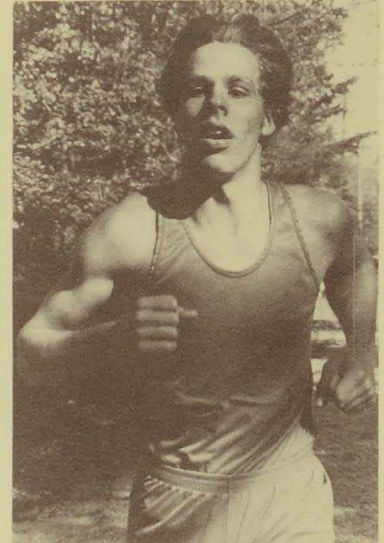
